## **Small Group Questions:**

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- 1. Jesus' response to the Jewish leaders was neither expected nor what they wanted to hear. How do we respond when Jesus doesn't tell us what we want to hear? Give an example of when this has happened to you.
- 2. Mark has brought us back to a similar theme time and time again: the kingdom of God prioritizes bringing about change on the inside of a person before changing one's external circumstances. How is this theme brought to bear in Jesus' response?
- 3. What is the distinction that Jesus makes between God's reign and Caesar's reign? How does this assertion relate to a passage like Isaiah 9:7? What about Revelation 11:15?
- 4. What did you think about what Pastor Nathan had to say about the sacred/secular divide?
- 5. Humanity bears the image of God (Genesis 1:26-27) and Jesus calls us to "give to God what is God's" meaning our WHOLE lives. What parts of your life do you find this the biggest challenge with (even as this dovetails the theme of 'ownership' from the previous Sunday's message)?
- 6. How have you interacted with the fasting invitation at the end of Pastor Nathan's message?
