Small Group Questions

- 1. What was the main thing you were left with from Pastor Matt's sermon?
- 2. Pastor Matt quoted a speech from the movie Mockingjay. Have there been speeches in movies or in real life that captured your heart? What do you think about Pastor Matt's daughter's observation about the church?
- 3. Randy Alcorn believes understanding Heaven "enables us to interpret our past and serve him in our present." Bartholomew and Goheen assert that "the hope of that kingdom's coming will shape all that we say and do in the here and now." Do you believe they are right? How does a vision of heaven affect your day to day life?
- 4. N.T. Wright believes that what we do now can "find its way, through the resurrecting power of God, in to the new creation which God will one day make." What have been some moments in your life where you have made the choice to build with "gold, silver and precious stones"?
 - Where in your life do you most see and experience Love? What is it like for you?
 - Where in your life do you most see and experience Beauty? What is it like for you?
 - Where in your life do you most see and experience Order? What is it like for you?
 - Where in your life do you most see and experience Abundance? What is it like for you?
- 5. N.T. Wright believes "the Christian Vocation is to be in prayer, in the Spirit, at the place where the world is in pain." Do you find yourself running into Self-Absorption, Utilitarianism, People doing what is right in their own eyes, Greed or Poverty regularly? Where do you feel the pain of these things the most?
- 6. Where in your own life can you see Self-Absorption, Utilitarianism, a desire for your own will, Greed or Poverty? N.T. Wright points out that "people who are called to be agents of God's healing love, putting the world to rights, are themselves to be people whose own lives are put to rights by the same healing love." Take a moment to pray and ask Jesus where you need his healing love. Write it down. Share with the group to the level you are comfortable.

As you take the journey of your life and discover in an ongoing way your own calling, is it possible that God might have wired you to be an agent of his Kingdom with a particular emphasis on Love, Beauty, Order or Abundance? Do you find yourself caring more about one of these things over the others?
- 8. T. E. Lawrence said "dreamers of the day are dangerous men, for they may act their dream with open eyes, to make it possible." What Heaven fuelled dreams do you have?
